An examination of the head and neck

An oral examination usually includes the following:

Facial development examination and examination of the development of the bite (occlusion).

Oral tissue examination (including gingivitis, cancer screening).

Dental and eruption check.

Radiographs are taken on an individual basis as indicated. Our radiographs are digitally enhanced to reduce the level of radiation below that of a sunny day.

A first visit

Depending on the need of your child, the first visit may be a double visit which includes:

The examination mentioned above.

A training session for younger children.

A professional cleaning and oral hygiene instruction.

Fluoride treatment.

Tips for better dental visits

Try to schedule siblings separately – this insures that each gets parental attention, and no one has to wait (and get fidgety).

Send in your forms, or remember to bring them in, so that your child doesn't have to wait while you fill them out in the office.

If your child must eat on the way to the office, budget enough time to brush the child's teeth before your appointment time. Examinations take longer and the child may lose patience if much time is spent in the dental chair uncovering teeth from a recent snack.

Please do not feed your child in the office. Other children may be undergoing a procedure that does not permit eating right away, and seeing your child eat can make them very uncomfortable.

It is far easier for children to visit the dentist in the morning. Treatments (and even examinations of preschoolers) are best schedule in the morning. This is well understood by educators.
